Taxonomy of Educational Objectives (1956), which resulted from their subsequent meetings, established three learning domains - cognitive, affective, and psychomotor - that educators continue to use today. Benjamin S. Bloom, educational psychologist and the handbook's editor, became the namesake of the widely used Bloom's taxonomy.

Psychomotor Domain Hierarchy; Level Definition Example; Observing: Active mental attending of a physical event. The learner watches a more experienced person. Other mental activity, such as reading may be a part of the observation process. Imitating: Attempted copying of a physical behavior. The second step in learning a psychomotor skill.

The psychomotor domain is one of three learning domains publicized in Bloom's Taxonomy. In the 1950's, Benjamin Bloom headed a group of educational psychologists whose goal was to develop a system of categories of learning behavior to assist in the design and assessment of educational learning. The group identified three domains of learning.

Factual knowledge : The basic elements candidates must know to be acquainted with a discipline.
Knowledge of terminology. Technical vocabulary, knowledge of symbols, knowledge of measures, knowledge of acronyms and abbreviations.

Bloom's Taxonomy of learning domains is a map of learning levels. Bloom chunked learning into 3 domains: Cognitive, Affective, and Psychomotor (or thinking, feeling, and doing.) Bloom's Taxonomy comprises three learning domains: the cognitive, affective, and psychomotor, and assigns to each of these domains a hierarchy that corresponds to different levels of learning. It's important to note that the different levels of thinking defined within each domain of the Taxonomy are hierarchical.

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
